To: Representatives Nygren, Genrich, Macco, Steffen and Kitchens:

We have reviewed the GOP Assembly K-12 funding plan and wanted to share our thoughts and concerns regarding the proposed plan.

We were pleased to see that your proposal includes an increase in the revenue cap floor for low-spending school districts. As you are aware, school districts in Brown County have been advocating an increase in revenue limits for low spending districts for some time to address inequities in opportunities afforded students in low revenue limit districts. However, we want to express our support for the Senate proposal that calls for the use of state funds to increase the revenue cap for low-spending districts vs. local property taxes.

In the GOP Assembly plan, we do support the following:

- 1. The elimination of any new funds being allocated directly to school buildings as a condition of new funding. We believe that it is important to provide school boards and administration the local control to leverage new resources where they will have the most impact on student achievement.
- 2. The increase of \$6 million in funding for mental health collaborative grants over the biennial budget.
- 3. The increase in funding for high-cost special education students.
- 4. The proposal to revert back to the previous method of calculating open enrollment aid transfer amounts for special education, which should save our District approximately \$1 million.

However, we do not support the GOP Assembly's proposal to increase the amount of revenue that follows students that open enroll out of their resident school districts. When reviewing the Legislative Fiscal Bureau Report, we noted that more than half of the school districts would be negatively impacted, thus creating winners and losers. We believe that this change to open enrollment should be addressed by the Blue Ribbon Task Force that was created to address equity in the current funding formula, since it has not had a hearing or opportunity for public comment.

Within Brown County many families have taken advantage of the choice opportunities available for a variety of reasons. In the past, the Legislature has always held that in offering choice to families, resident school districts should be held harmless, with the recognition that when a student choices to another district, the resident school district's costs don't necessarily reduce by the amount of the per pupil student revenue. For the Green Bay Area Public School District this change in funding level would result in a loss of revenue of more than \$2M, significantly impacting the students who are served in our school district. In addition, all school districts voluntarily accept open enrolled students and do so fully aware of the current funding allowed under the law.

Again, we are very appreciative of your efforts to support K-12 public education.
